Desert Colors

Local Arizona artists Melinda Jennings and Ty McEwen are inspired by the landscape of the Southwest. Although the work of Jennings and McEwen share a common subject matter, cacti, their styles and art making processes are quite different. While they both interpret desert flora in a realistic manner, Jennings paints in a softer color palette than McEwen's vivid color choices. McEwen re-imagines the desert landscape with his own perspective and Jennings often paints on location. Native to the Americas and often associated with the Southwest, these unique plants that survive in such harsh conditions have been valued by people for thousands of years. Today, scientists study cacti to help create sustainable solutions, such as energy efficiency, water resistance and water conservation. This process of "copying nature to create new ideas and products" is called biomimicry. This summer (May 19-Aug. 26), the Gallery at Tempe Center for the Arts is coordinating an exhibition called "Biomimicry: nature inspired design" that also reflects on the value of bio-inspired work that utilizes the arts and sciences as overlapping strategies for inquiry and innovation.
